FROM THE DEPUTY PRINCIPAL

Student Services Update

At Southern Cross District High School, we pride ourselves on the care and support that we are able to provide our students. Small class sizes allow all teachers and staff to get to know their students at a level that many larger schools aren't capable of. Our remote location also produces challenges when accessing support services that are designed to strengthen the health and wellbeing of our community, particularly in relation to staff turnover and the frequency of their visits. Coupled with the nation-wide alarming increases in mental health concerns amongst our youth, managing our students' social and emotional well-being is becoming a significant focus at Southern Cross District High School. This year, we have been very proactive and diligent in networking with multiple health promotion organisations to enable students to access the support services required in order to maximise their overall health and development. Below you will find a brief summary of some of the external health providers that we are currently engaging with.

School Chaplain

Our Chaplain, Heather Van Oyen, visits approximately 4 times throughout the term. Teachers and/or parents are able to request students to feature on the Chaplain list on a rotating basis. Heather has a fantastic relationship with our students and provides a very valuable, confidential, external and unbiased support service to our students. She will often keep in contact with her students in between her visits and send communication letters to connect and develop relationships with her clients.

> School Psychologist

Our Psychologist, Vanessa Bye, has been working with several children this semester, visiting approximately each fortnight. Unfortunately, Vanessa has recently retired from this positon and we will be expecting a new Psychologist, Chloe Willcocks, to be commencing as soon as possible which is fantastic. In order for students to be referred to the Psychologist, the classroom teacher or an administration staff member must gain parental permission and complete a referral form. The Psychologist can provide assistance at a mental, emotional and social level, including academic testing, learning support as well as work to improve students' overall well-being as required.

WA Country Health Service (WACHS) – Child Development Services

Our Community Health Nurse, Jessica Della Bosca, works with all students ranging from Kindergarten to Year 10. She has recently completed the Kindergarten health checks, and can work with students across all year levels as required. Jessica works with both our teachers, students, and parents to promote health as well as to advise and educate the community around positive health practices. She is capable of doing a range of health testing and, with guardian consent, can be referred to base on a parental or teacher request. Jessica also provides a valuable connection between other health networks and professionals within the WA Country Health Service that we heavily rely on. Within the Child Development Service, we also access Allied Health Services, including Speech Pathology, Occupational Therapy, Physiotherapy, Social Work, Dietitian and Health Promotion. The visiting Speech Pathologist, Georgia Otto, and Occupational Therapist, Ashleigh Cornish, work with several of our students and their guardians to maximise the development of their language, motor and cognitive skills across a diverse range of areas. Visiting approximately each fortnight, they work closely with their clients and their respective teachers in the form of case conferences, providing valuable insights and suggestions that can be implemented both at home and in the classroom.

Other allied health services can visit on request. Any student can be referred to the child development service and can be referred by teachers, parents or any other persons. > Police

Southern Cross District High School and the local Police station have a very positive, professional relationship that ultimately works to increase the health and wellbeing of both our students and the broader community. We work together closely to provide a holistic support approach as well as to provide many engaging and educational learning opportunities. The school and the Police are in the process of planning our annual NAIDOC Day celebration scheduled for Wednesday 31st July, intending to maximise cultural awareness and understanding. The Wheatbelt Youth Council is an additional shared initiative that provides valuable leadership opportunities, allowing students to directly engage with the officers and local council members.

SSEN Disability

In Term 1, an Autism specialist from the School of Special Educational Needs Disability (SSEND) has been working closely with our teachers to enhance how our school can best support all students and in particular, those with Autism. The specialist provided professional learning for our whole teaching staff and continues to shape the way our teachers accommodate for students and their varying needs.

In Term 3, an alternative consultant will also be visiting the school to complete various whole-school observations and assessments of our students, particularly those that appear to be having difficulties and delays with their literacy development. They will be working with staff to deliver some targeted professional learning and to provide recommendations regarding workable strategies and intervention programs that may benefit our students.

Child and Adolescent Mental Health Service

The Child and Adolescent Mental Health Service provides mental health programs to infants, children and young people up to the age of 17. This includes services in the community and in a hospital setting. Children and families are referred to these services by their treating therapist, specialist, General Practitioner, school or other community organisation. Within this external service, students have access to our current Clinical Psychologist, Leesa Murray.

Our Student Councillors have had a very busy term fundraising for Nulla Nulla Farm

Retreat. As a result of their Cheesy Bun Stall, Pyjama Free Dress Day and Donut Stall they raised \$71, \$105 and \$223 respectively. In Western Australia, children can start their education in Kindergarten, however compulsory schooling starts the following year in Pre-primary.

Who needs to enrol?

You need to apply to enrol your children in school for 2020 if they are:

- starting Kindergarten 4 years old by 30 June 2020
- starting Pre-primary, the first year of compulsory school 5 years old by 30 June 2020
- starting Year 7, the first year of secondary school
- changing schools.

Enrolments are now open. Please contact your local school for an enrolment pack by Friday 26 July 2019.

All children of compulsory school age must be enrolled in school and attend every day – this is the law. All children must attend school up until they are 16 years old. Sixteen and 17 year olds must be enrolled in school or a training organisation, be employed or be in a combination of school/training/employment.
